The consequences of sin should lead to repentance.

I. The LORD's anger burned against Israel again - 2 Samuel 24: ¹ *The LORD's anger burned against Israel again, and he stirred up David against them to say: "Go, count the people of Israel and Judah."* **& 1 Chronicles 21:** ¹ *Satan rose up against Israel and incited David to count the people of Israel.*

The Lord was angry at Israel and He permitted Satan to incite David to conduct a census. There was nothing wrong with a census done as the Bible proscribed. A Exodus 30:13-14 says that every adult male in the nation was to pay half a shekel of silver into the sanctuary coffers, a significant expense for most of the people. Exodus 30:12,16, said there would be a plague if the census money was not used to redeem the people.

The census was permitted but not commanded, and it was discouraged by the threat of a plague. A centralized, powerful state was never the biblical ideal ^B. But, David was the king and the people were organized by his administration. The census was probably to prepare for Solomon's reign, but no half-shekel tax was collected. Therefore, Israel had to be punished.

Solomon updated Davids census information prior to organizing the nation into groups for forced labor or taxation and to set up twelve administrative districts. ^C These districts to some degree erased the old tribal boundaries. This was the very thing that Exodus 30 meant to discourage. the reduction of the significance of the tribes and the enhancement of a central administration. The tribes were an ancient part of Israels identity, and Solomons reorganization did much damage to it. The forced labor to which Israel was subjected in effect returned them to what they were in Egypt: slaves. This began with an improper census.

II. David ordered Joab to conduct a census of the men in Israel - 2 Samuel 24: ² So the king said to Joab, the commander of his army, "Go through all the tribes of Israel from Dan to Beer-sheba and register the troops so I can know their number."

³ Joab replied to the king, "May the LORD your God multiply the troops a hundred times more than they are—while my lord the king looks on! But why does my lord the king want to do this?" **1Chronicles 21:3** *Joab replied,...Why should he bring guilt on Israel*?

⁴ Yet the king's order prevailed over Joab and the commanders of the army.

⁸ When they had gone through the whole land, they returned to Jerusalem at the end of nine months and twenty days. ⁹ Joab gave the king the total of the registration of

There were eight hundred thousand valiant armed men <u>from Israel</u> and five hundred thousand men <u>from Judah</u>. [1,300,000 - probably rounded numbers - without the Levites, the tribe of Benjamin and the women and children]

Joab knew that taking a census was a bad idea and could result in a plague if a half a shekel of silver tax to redeem the people was not collected. However, David prevailed and over nearly 10 months the census was taken. This was a time when **David did not seek the counsel of God**, but was tempted by Satan. He might have been thinking that when Solemn took over as king he would have a large geographic area to govern with 12 tribes and he wanted to set up an organization to prepare for the young kings reign.

This is the kind of temptation Disciples face today. As parents or grandparents we may attempt to shelter our young people from the reality of a hard life as adults fighting in a battle every day between the forces of good and evil. Instead we should prepare them to become independent adults prepared to live one day at a time depending on Jesus no matter what the circumstances are.

Despite David's planning A, this did not turn out to well for Solomon because he was drawn astray by David's sins and the false god's of his many wives. When Solomon died; the kingdom split into the 10 northern tribes-Israel and 2 southern tribes-Judah.

What kind of example are you providing for the future generations of your family?

Notes: A- David's planning for Solomon included developing a plan for the future temple, raising the money for construction, arranging for materials and workers. 1 Chronicles 22-29; B- Israel split up - 1 Kings 12 - 930BC, then Israel was destroyed by Assyria in 722BC - 2 Kings 17:6-41, Judah by Babylon 605-586BC - 2 Chronicles 36:5-21, Cyrus permits return 535BC - 2 Chronicles 36:22-23

III. Confession of David - 2 Samuel 24:10 David's conscience troubled him after he had taken a census of the troops. He said to the LORD, "<u>I have sinned greatly</u> in what I've done. Now, LORD, because I've been very foolish, please take away your servant's guilt."

The census took 9 months and 20 days and then some time to tabulate the result and it was not until receiving the results that David was convicted by the Holy Spirit A of his sin. Maybe he realized that they had not collected the required tax from each man of 1/2 shekel and that God had said that would result in a plague. B Or maybe he realized that Joab had been right about warning him not to take the census.

Whatever the reason David confessed his sin and sought the Lords forgiveness. When he confessed his sins of adultery and murder, David said, *Whave sinned+*; but when he confessed his sin of the census, he said, *Whave sinned greatly*".

Most of us would consider his sins relating to Bathsheba far worse than the sin of the census. Davidos sins with Bathsheba took the lives of four of Davidos sons [the baby,

Amnon, Absalom, and Adonijah] plus the life of Uriah, Ahithophel, and the 20,000 troops in the battle to reclaim the throne. After the census, God sent a plague that took the lives of 70,000 people. This may be a confirmation that the sin was greater.

There are 2 lessons for us today; [1] be very careful to seek guidance from the Holy Spirit, the Bible, the mind of Christ and others when making decisions, [2] and keep short accounts in self-examination for sin on a daily basis. David had at least ten months when he could have stopped the census but waited until it was complete.

Maintain a Biblical decision making process for your life and constantly examine your life for any sin that should be confessed.

IV. Consequences of sin - 2 Samuel 24:11-15... When David got up in the morning, the word of the LORD had come to the prophet Gad, David's seer [Prophet]: 12 "Go and say to David, 'This is what the LORD says: I am offering you three choices. Choose one of them, and I will do it to you."

God gave David the choice of how he would be punished: three years of famine, three months of military defeat, or three days of plague. A The punishments strike the nation at large, possibly because they had not paid the 1/2 shekel tax required during a census B or because "The LORD's anger burned against Israel again," c

In verse 14, David gave the choice back to God: "please, let us fall into the Lord's hands because His mercies are great, but don't let me fall into human hands". His answer reflects faith in the promise that was given to Moses: "The Lord—the Lord is a compassionate and gracious God, slow to anger and abounding in faithful love and truth, maintaining faithful love to a thousand generations, forgiving iniquity, rebellion, and sin",D. The punishment was severe; seventy thousand men died.

In the census, the total number of men was one million three hundred thousand (v. 9), and of these seventy thousand died or over 5 percent of the men died in three days. This was a deadly plague. The plague extended from the north to the south of Israel, just as the census.

It may seem that the punishment was out of proportion to the sin of David and Israel. But one sin—one decision or action—can carry with it disastrous results? Can you think of examples of this in your life?

David's sincere remorse for his sin - 2 Samuel 24:16-17...****In Then the angel extended his hand toward Jerusalem to destroy it, but the LORD relented concerning the destruction and said to the angel who was destroying the people, "Enough, withdraw your hand now!" The angel of the LORD was then at the threshing floor of Araunah the Jebusite.

When David saw the angel striking the people, he said to the LORD, "Look, <u>I am the one</u> who has sinned; I am the one who has done wrong. But these sheep, what have they done? Please, let your hand be against me and my father's family."

As promised the plague started the next day at morning and continued for three days, with the judgment angel ending his work at Jerusalem, just as Joab and his men had done ^A. We know that 70,000 died, 5% of the men counted died in 3 days. Davids heart was broken because of this judgment, and he pleaded with the Lord to punish him and his family instead. Why would God kill seventy thousand men and yet keep David alive? V.24:1 says that God was angry with Israel, so He was punishing the people for sin they had committed and David's punishment was the anguish over Israel.

David begged the Lord to let His hand be against him and his family and for mercy for "the sheep of His pasture" ^B. The elders of Israel were with David ^C and with him "fell on their faces" in humble remorse and worship. David sin had precipitated the crisis, but the elders realized that the nation had sinned and deserved to receive God discipline.

We can compare this judgment to the great 1918-19 flu epidemic which may have killed as much as 5% of the worlds population. ^D The 1918 flu epidemic hit the US army hard close to end of World War I because it spread fast among people in tight quarters like barracks and ships from the USA to Europe. My mother was 4 years old in 1918, caught the flu, and refused taking the medicine available. The doctors told her mother don't worry she is going to die with or without the medicine, but she survived! A plague that killed 5% of today's population would kill 365 million people.

David's willingness to offer up himself and his family may have been a part of stopping the plague. The sacrifice of Jesus made possible the forgiveness of sin and stopped the plague of eternity in hell for all who believe in Him.

VI. God in His Compassion stopped the Plague - 2 Samuel 24:18-25... ¹⁸ Gad came to David that day and said to him, "Go up and set up an altar to the LORD on the threshing floor of Araunah the Jebusite." ¹⁹ David went up in obedience to Gad's command, just as the LORD had commanded. ²¹ Araunah said, "Why has my lord the king come to his servant?" David replied, "To buy the threshing floor from you in order to build an altar to

Then the LORD was receptive to prayer for the land, and the plague on Israel ended.

The prophet Gad said, David was to build an altar on Omans threshing floor and there offer sacrifices to the Lord, and the plague would cease. As king, David could have appropriated the property or even borrowed it, but he insisted on purchasing it. When the priest offered the sacrifices. God sent fire from heaven to consume them as a signal of His acceptance. A

The land that David purchased was the place where Abraham had put his son Isaac on the altar ^B and where Solomon would build the temple ^C. This area today is the subject of world wide debate while most of it is being controlled by Muslims.

God used David's two great sins for His glory! Bathsheba gave birth to Solomon and God chose him to succeed David on the throne. On the property David purchased and on which he erected an altar to stop the plague, Solomon built the temple and dedicated it to the glory of God. What God did for David is certainly not an excuse for sin ^D, for David paid dearly for committing those sins. However, knowing what God did for David encourages us to seek His presence and trust His grace when we have disobeyed Him. "But where sin increased, grace abounded all the more" ^F. What a merciful God we serve!

Are you willing to trust God's grace when you have disobeyed Him? What kind of sacrifices should we give to God in gratitude for what He did at the cross? [See Hebrews 13:15-17, Romans 12:1]

David's Altar
